



Summer at Hooks Wood has been a time to sit back, enjoy the weather and allow nature to flourish.

The trees that had such a waterlogged start to life earlier in the year have put on fantastic growth. Wildflowers, butterflies and many other creatures have come and gone.

Perhaps most satisfying of all is to see how well-trodden the paths have become, a sure sign that people have been out and about enjoying the woodland.

Work in progress at the pond

We have started some work to encourage more wildlife to thrive in and around the pond. Over the summer, tree contractors cut back the willow trees which were growing out of the water. This has allowed light to reach the water for the first time in many years. The wonderful view over the surrounding countryside was an unexpected bonus.

We would like to use some of the tree trunks and brushwood to create informal seating/play features/den-building resources, as well as leaving some to decay naturally. We would love to hear from anyone with a particular interest in helping with this or any ideas or skills they can share.

For the pond, the next step will be to remove the remaining willow stumps and roots to prevent future re-growth. It will then need to be dredged, scraping out the deep layer of fallen leaves which has built up over many years, to improve both the water quality and pond safety. If we are lucky there may be dormant plant seeds in the deeper soil left behind which will be ready to spring into life once conditions are right. National Tree Week, 27th November – 5th December



We have about 200 trees still to plant and when better than during National Tree Week? We know that many people who would have liked to join in weren't able to help with the initial planting, so we are planning a community planting day on Saturday 27th November, 10am to 4pm; a chance to put a spade in the ground and plant even just one young tree, especially if you missed out earlier in the year. We are grateful to the Tree Council for their recent grant of £1000 towards this extra planting. The trees will cost a relatively small fraction of the grant. With the larger share we will be able to afford to go plastic-free and organic; to try out new bio-degradable plastic-free tree protection tubes, and to purchase more woodchip to mulch around each newly planted tree as an alternative to repeated weed-spraying.
